#### **Tech Specs for the curious**

The movie is being recorded with a Canon 7D and a Canon T3i. Both are recording in 1080 24p, which means the image is 1920 x 1080 pixels this is a High Definition format (please do not call it 1080HD, as you cannot have 1080 Standard Definition. Just like calling a circle a 'perfect circle'; if it wasn't perfect, it would not be a circle; it would be an ellipse, so you can just say 'circle'.)

The '24p' means that it is being recorded in 24 frames per second like film — but not, since video is NOT film and therefore it is 23.97 frames a second and with a 3:2 pull down [will not explain that one, spend \$40k and go to school for that like I did] you can get 24 frames per second when transferring the movie to actual film, which is what we are in hopes of doing.

The 1080 image will then be matted to 2:39:1 aspect ration, sometimes called Scope or Panavision, giving it a cinematic epic look.
